



¹When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. ²For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. ³And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. ⁴My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, ⁵so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God.



The Rite of Ordination

Presentation

The ordinand is presented to Bishop Gronberg and to the assembly.

I present for ordination to the ministry of word and sacrament *Mallory Camille Morris*, who has been prepared, examined, and approved for this ministry and who has been called by the church to this ministry through *First United Lutheran Church*.

Thanks be to God.

Address and Questions

Bishop Gronberg addresses the ordinand.

All baptized Christians are called to share in Christ's ministry of love and service in the world, to the glory of God and for the sake of the human family and the whole creation. According to apostolic usage you are now to be entrusted with the office of word and sacrament in the one holy catholic church by the laying on of hands and by prayer.

A reading from John: Jesus said, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.

Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." (John 20:21-23)

A reading from Matthew: Jesus said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me.

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

A reading from First Corinthians: I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he

was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes. (1 Corinthians 11:23-26)

Bishop Gronberg questions the ordinand.

Before almighty God, to whom you must give account, and in the presence of this assembly, I ask: Will you assume this office, believing that the church's call is God's call to the ministry of word and sacrament?

Mallory: I will, and I ask God to help me.

The church in which you are to be ordained confesses that the holy scriptures are the word of God and are the norm of its faith and life. We accept, teach, and confess the Apostles', the Nicene, and the Athanasian Creeds. We also acknowledge the Lutheran confessions as true witnesses and faithful expositions of the holy scriptures. Will you therefore preach and teach in accordance with the holy scriptures and these creeds and confessions?

Mallory: I will, and I ask God to help me.

Will you be diligent in your study of the holy scriptures and faithful in your use of the means of grace? Will you pray for God's people, nourish them with the word and sacraments, and lead them by your own example in faithful service and holy living?

Mallory: I will, and I ask God to help me.

Will you give faithful witness in the world, that God's love may be known in all that you do?

Mallory: I will, and I ask God to help me.

Almighty God, who has given you the will to do these things, graciously give you the strength and compassion to perform them.

Make her a faithful pastor, patient teacher, and wise counselor. Grant that in all things she may serve without reproach, that your people may be renewed and your name be glorified in the church; through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

The assembly is seated.

Giving of a Stole

Ordinand stands and receives the stole as the following words are spoken by Bishop Gronberg:

Receive this stole as a sign of your work, and live in obedience to the Lord Jesus, serving his people and remembering his promise: "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30)

Charge

Pastors Kristen Klade, Mallory Czutor, Kyle Rouze, and Jeff Bergeron deliver the charges

Pr. Rouze: Hear the words of the apostles: Pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the eternal life to which you were called. (1 Timothy 6:11-12)

Pr. Klade: And again: Take heed to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you guardians, to feed the church of God that he obtained with the blood of his own Son. (Acts 20:28)

Pr. Bergeron: And again: Tend the flock of God that is in your charge, not under compulsion but willingly, not for sordid gain but eagerly. Do not lord it over those in your charge, but be examples to the flock. And when the chief shepherd appears, you will win the crown of glory that never fades away. (1 Peter 5:2-4)

Pr. Czutor: *And again:* Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries. Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found trustworthy. *(1 Corinthians 4:1-2)*

Bishop Gronberg continues.

Mallory, care for God's people, bear their burdens, and do not betray their confidence.

So discipline yourself in life and teaching that you preserve the truth, giving no occasion for false security or illusory hope. Witness faithfully in word and deed to all people. Give and receive comfort as you serve within the church. And be of good courage, for God has called you, and your labor in the Lord is not in vain.

Blessing

The God of peace, who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant, make you complete in everything good so that you may do God's will, working in you that which is pleasing in God's sight; through Jesus Christ, to whom be the glory forever and ever.

Acclamation by the Assembly

The ministers and the ordinand face the assembly. Bishop Gronberg addresses the assembly.

Will you pray for her, help and honor her for her work's sake, and in all things strive to live together in the peace and unity of Christ?

Let it be acclaimed that Mallory is a called and ordained minister in the church of Christ. She has Christ's authority to preach the word of God and administer the sacraments, serving God's people as together we bear God's creative and redeeming love to all the world.


Holy God, mighty Lord, gracious Father:

Ordination

Ordination is the term used for a candidate's entrance into the ministry of Word and Sacrament. After obtaining a four-year Master of Divinity degree or participating in TEEM Ministry (Theological Education for Emerging Ministries), receiving approval from a synod candidacy committee, and accepting a call from a specific ministry setting, the ordained person becomes a pastor charged with giving leadership and vision to Christian communities of faith by preaching, offering the sacraments, teaching and witnessing to the Scriptures. In addition to church congregations, pastors also extend the ministry of Word and Sacrament into specialized settings such as health care chaplaincy, colleges and seminaries, camps and missionary fields.

Today, you will see lots of Lutheran pastors opting to wear white albs for this service. If it seems odd that I'm not in white, let me explain why I've opted for something different:

Many of you know that I did not grow up Lutheran; rather, I grew up as a Baptist. This is the church tradition that raised me and helped form the foundation of who I am, today. And when I was growing up, particularly in the black church tradition, it wasn't uncommon to see pastors in black robes. As such, I could think of no better way to acknowledge this foundational tradition—the experiences, the teaching, and the people—than by choosing to wear black today. Wearing black is a reminder that I did not arrive at this moment in a vacuum, and that I stand on the shoulders of not just faithful Lutheran pastors, but also the shoulders of so many faithful Baptist pastors who loved God and faithfully taught saints like me to do the same. --Pr.
